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## Foreword

Chapter's list of Twentieth Century Buildings has been prepared by the Historic Buildings Committee as a guide to persons wanting to see examples of buildings of this century which are generally accepted as being of architectural significance and

a reference for architects and others who may be involved in projects affecting such buildings.

This list should be regarded as supplementing and to be read in conjunction with the list compiled by the National Trust and other bodies. The Trust's list deals mainly with the nineteenth century and takes account of historical associations and significance as well as architectural quality. Chapter's criteria are based on architectural values only and its list is the result of a careful assessment of prevailing professional opinion. In addition, it is limited to the period 1900-1950, but it is open-ended and the Committee intends to add new names as reputations become firmly established or as new examples are discovered. It is hoped that interested persons will bring likely examples to the notice of the Committee.

The 150 examples included have been stringently selected from a much more extensive list. The list includes the most significant examples of the work of leading architects, those buildings which are recognised as important landmarks in the development of architecture and those which, because of their quality and siting, make a significant contribution to their environment. It is hoped that the list will be of guidance to members and assist them in the implementation of Chapter's Policy on the Preservation of Architecturally valuable Buildings. However, members should not restrict action in accordance with that Policy to listed buildings as, for practical reasons, it has not yet been possible to make the list a complete catalogue. Much research remains to be done, particularly outside the Sydney area; nor have significant non-architect designed buildings yet received their due attention. It is intended to rectify these omissions in due course.

Other lists of significant buildings which should be consulted are:

National Trust Register – (revised annually).

State Planning Authority list of proclaimed buildings.

Sydney City Council – Register of historic buildings within the Sydney City area.

New South Wales list of proclaimed historic buildings.

In addition various Local Government Bodies and Historic Societies have lists of important buildings in their districts.

**A.C.I. Building (now Dept. of Education).** 1. Cnr. William & Boomerang Sts. 2. 1938 3. Stephenson & Turner 4. International style; glass brick facade for a glass manufacturer.

**Peapes' Men's Wear Store (now N.S.W. Permanent Building Society).** 1. 185-7 George St 2. 1925 3. W. Hardy Wilson 4. Refined Georgian Revival shop building — the architect designed all the shop fittings as well. Altered internally, and loggia added in space formerly occupied by shop windows, 1971.

**Bonds Wear Factory [formerly Top Dog Clothing Factory].** 1. Pittwater Road 2. 1949 3. Spencer, Spencer & Bloomfield 4. Sulman Medal 1950.

### CASTLECRAIG 2068

**House.** 1. 138 Edinburgh Road 2. 1921 3. Walter Burley Griffin 4. Originally known as G.S.D.A. House no. 1.

**House.** 1. 140 Edinburgh Road 2. 1921 3. Walter Burley Griffin 4. Originally known as G.S.D.A. House no. 2.

**House.** 1. 8 The Parapet 2. 1922 3. Walter Burley Griffin; remodelling: 1949 Eric Nicholls [not supervised] 1965 Robert G. McLurcan 4. Built for Julius Grant. Griffin lived in the house as Grant's tenant from 1922.

**House.** 1. 14 The Parapet 2. 1922 3. Walter Burley Griffin 4. Built for Cheok Hong Cheang.

**House.** 1. 158 Edinburgh Road 2. 1924 3. Walter Burley Griffin 4. First "Knitlock" house in Sydney. Built for T.P. Felstead.

**House.** 1. 15 The Citadel 2. 1929-30 3. Walter Burley Griffin 4. Built for T.W. Fishwick.

**House.** 1. 2 The Barquette 2. 1929-30 3. Walter Burley Griffin 4. Built for T.H.R. Wilson.

**House.** 1. 8 The Barquette 2. 1933-4 3. Walter Burley Griffin 4. Built for A.F. Duncan.

**House.** 1. 3 The Bastion 2. 1938 3. Eric Nicholls 4. Built for G.L.C. Baracchi.

**House.** 1. 42 The Bulwark 2. 1949 3. Eric Nicholls 4. The closest thing in Australia to a Wright "Usonian" house. Terminates vista at end of road. Built for E.A. Hedbury.

**Additions to house.** 1. 12 The Parapet 2. 1940's 3. Eric Nicholls 4. Designed in the 1940's and executed mainly in the 1950's, extensive alterations to a Griffin house of 1922. Nicholls added the first floor and changed the ground floor. The front door and the gate are by Nicholls, not by Griffin. This was Nicholl's own house.

**Concord Repatriation General Hospital [formerly 113th Australian General Hospital].** 1. Hospital Road 2. 1942 3. Stephenson & Turner 4. Sulman Medal 1946.

#### CREMORNE 2090

**House.** 1. 11 Cranbrook Avenue 2. 1919 3. Esplin & Mould 4. Early and accomplished Californian bungalow.

**House.** 1. 7 Cranbrook Avenue 2. 1919 builder: Alexander Stewart Jolly 4. Prime example of the larger more mature Californian bungalow — the best work of a highly individual designer.

**House.** 1. 6 Milson Road 2. 1906 3. Rutledge Louat 4. Early flat-roofed house.

#### DARLING POINT 2027

**House "Craigend".** 1. 86 Darling Point Road 2. 1935 3. Frank I.A. Bloomfield 4. International style house with Moorish overtones — these elements brought by the owner from Middle Eastern Mosques. Built for Mr. Patrick. National Trust Classification 'C'.

**House "Eastcliffe".** 1. 14 Greenoaks Avenue 2. 1912 3. Burcham Clamp 4. Architect's own house, a very simple structure for its time; exposed brickwork internally.

**House "Raine House" [formerly "Yeomerry" also known as "Wirrillah"].** 1. 1 St. Marks Road 2. 1913 3. Halligan & Wilton 4. Built for H.C. Reading.

**House "Babworth House".** 1. Mitchell Road through to Mt. Adelaide Street 2. 1905 3. Morrow & de Putron 4. Large Art Nouveau house built for Anthony Hordern Esq.

**House "Pitclarnie".** 1. 12 Greenoaks Avenue 2. 1922 3. Ross & Rowe 4. H.E. Ross's own house.

**House "Alnwick House".** 1. 11 St. Marks Road 2. 1917 3. B.J. Waterhouse 4. Built for Leonard Dodds Esq.

**Flats "Buckhurst".** 1. 574 New South Head Road 2. 1926 3. Wardell, Moore & Dowling 4. Block of large luxury flats Queen Anne/Georgian style. Very sophisticated.

**House.** 1. 6 Wiston Gardens 2. 1933 3. Professor Leslie Wilkinson 4. Sulman Medal 1934.

**House.** 1. 4 Wiston Gardens 2. 1934 3. Professor Leslie Wilkinson 4. Built for Dr. H.A. Sweetapple.

#### EDGECLIFF 2027

**Post Office.** 1. Cnr. New South Head Road & Edgecliff Road 2. 1940 3. Government Architect [Commonwealth] 4. Severe but sensitive functional style building. Top floor added by Peter Duffield [arch] 1972.

**House.** 1. 434 Edgecliff Road 2. 1935 3. John D. Moore 4. Large simple two-storeyed house using traditional elements, and planned for sunshine, breezes and outdoor living. Excellent quality of natural light inside. Still original colour (1973). Built for Dr. A.E. Mills.

**House "Fenton".** 1. 8 Albert Street 2. 1919 3. Robin Dods [Spain, Cosh & Dods] 4. Colonial Revival house, built for the architect.

#### ELIZABETH BAY 2011

**House "Boomerang".** 1. Billyard Avenue 2. 1926 3. Simpson 4. The only example in Sydney of the extremely ornate Morocco Spanish Mission "Hollywood" style.

**Flats "Birtley Towers".** 1. Birtley Place 2. 1933 3. Emil Sodersten 4. American sky-scraper style building with detail of the Aztec style of Griffin & Nicholls, in whose office Sodersten had worked.

**Flats "Illowra Lodge" [originally "Marlborough Hall"].** 1. Barnclough Square 2. 1935 3. Emil Sodersten 4. See comment for "Birtley Towers".

#### GORDON 2072

**House "Burnham Thorp".** 1. 10 Edward Street 2. 1938 3. F. Glynn Gilling 4. Large suburban house displaying popular 1930's taste by an architect who could handle large-scale domestic design. Built for G. Woolcott-Forbes.

**House.** 1. 738 Pacific Highway 2. c. 1935 3. Laurie & Heath 4. Large accomplished "Queen Anne" house.

**House.** 1. 67 Elgin Street 2. 1940 3. Gerard H.B. McDonell 4. Architect's own house — an example of rational traditional construction. Sulman Medal 1940.

**House "Eryldene".** 1. 17 MacIntosh Street 2. 1914 3. W. Hardy Wilson 4. Colonial Revival house sensitively conceived. Built for Professor E.G. Waterhouse.

#### KILLARA 2071

**House "Morningside".** 1. Maples Avenue cnr Werona Avenue 2. 1930's 3. Augustus Aley 4. Romantic Sydney suburban style. The architect's own house.

**House.** 1. 3 Maytone Avenue 2. 1945 3. Sydney Ancher 4. Architect's own house; one of the first modern post war houses — influential. Sulman Medal, 1945.

**Group of houses.** 1. 2, 4, 6 Maytone Avenue 2. No. 2. 1951, No. 4. 1948, No. 6. 1950 3. Sydney Ancher 4. Influential modern post-war house, well-sited, and a good streetscape.

**House "Fountains".** 1. 7 Roper Place 2. 1940 3. A.J. Browne 4. Mediterranean-style house with dramatic landscaped garden, pond, courtyard and terraces. Architect's own house.

**House.** 1. 33 Marian Street 2. 1932-3 3. Walter Burley Griffin, built for A.C. Cameron.

**House.** 1. 55 Illeroy Avenue 2. 1948 3. A.H.A. Hanson 4. Architect's own house. Sulman Medal 1948.

**House.** 1. 4 Springdale Road 2. 1940 3. J. Aubrey Kerr 4. International style house; first cantilevered concrete awning.

**House.** 1. 4 Lynwood Avenue 2. 1916 3. Peddle & Thorp [S.G. Thorp] 4. Early Californian bungalow.

**Metro Theatre.** 1. Hughes Street 2. 1940 3. Bruce Dellit [Crick & Furze did working drawings and construction].

**Fire Station.** 1. Cnr. Darlinghurst Rd & Victoria Street 2. 1910 3. N.S.W. Government Architect [W.L. Vernon] possibly attributable to Moyes, who had worked in Mackintosh's office.

#### MANLY 2095

**Surf Pavilion.** 1. South end of Manly Beach 2. 1938 3. Eric W. Andrew 4. Sydney Ancher was working in Andrews' office at the time, and did the working drawings. Sulman Medal 1939.

#### MOSMAN 2088

**House.** 1. 201 Spit Road 2. 1930 3. Fowell & McConnel 4. First International style house in Sydney.

**House.** 1. 161 Raglan Street 2. 1900 3. E. Jeaffreson Jackson 4. The first large single-storeyed Queen Anne bungalow. Altered.

**House.** 1. 37A Raglan Street 2. c. 1930 3. John D. Moore 4. Simple bungalow employing traditional elements. Built for Alfred E. Hill.

**House.** 1. 37 Raglan Street 2. 1917 3. Peddle & Thorp 4. Early Californian bungalow showing influence of Greene & Greene work — open planning and natural finishes. Interesting leadlighted glass. Built for Cyril Monk.

#### MOORE PARK 2010

**Sydney Boys' High School.** 1. Anzac Parade 3. Leith Macredie 4. Classical school building.

#### NEUTRAL BAY 2089

**House "Baden House".** 1. Baden Road 2. 1937 3. Fowell & McConnel 4. International style house — designed for southern view and northern sun. Built for E.K. White.

**House "The Cobbles".** 1. 49 Shell Cove Road 2. 1918 3. S.G. Thorp [Peddle & Thorp] 4. Early Californian bungalow showing direct influence of Greene & Greene work. Extended 1927 and 1935 by architect S.G. Thorp's own house.

**House "Ailsa".** 1. 33 Shell Cove Road 2. 1909 3. B.J. Waterhouse 4. Built for Captain Robert Craig.

**House "Brent Knowle".** 1. 31 Shell Cove Road 2. 1914 3. B.J. Waterhouse 4. Built for Major G. Evans-Booker. National Trust classification 'C'.

**House "The Gables".** 1. 16 Spruson Street 2. 1920 3. B.J. Waterhouse 4. The architect's own house — a vigorous handling of traditional elements — every planning problem perfectly solved.

#### PALM BEACH 2108

**House.** 1. 1170 Barrenjoey Road 2. 1939 3. Arthur Baldwinson 4. Early "modern" house. Weatherboarding originally oiled, now painted.

**House.** 1. 120 Pacific Road 2. c. 1940 3. Ellice Nosworthy 4. Sensitive traditional house by accomplished domestic architect.

#### PENNANT HILLS 2120

**"Regenbah".** 1. The Crescent 2. c. 1910 3. G. Sydney Jones. Early flat roofed house.

#### POINT PIPER 2027

**House.** 1. 1 Wolsley Crescent 2. 1936-7 3. Eric Nicholls 4. Designed on hexagonal plan. Built for G.F. Watson.

#### POTTS POINT 2011

**Flats.** 1. 17 Wylde Street 2. 1951 3. A.M. Bolot 4. Early post-WW. II highrise flats.

**Flats "Kingsclere".** 1. Cnr. Greenknowe Ave & Macleay Street 2. 1913 3. Halligan & Wilton 4. Early high-rise flats – the first in Kings Cross.

**Flats "Wyldfel Gardens".** 1. 8A Wylde Street 2. 1935 3. Unknown (Hardwell?) 4. International style garden flats stepping down a harbourside site – each flat has a lawn terrace on the roof of the flat below. Excellent urban living.

#### PYMBLE 2073

**House.** 1. 29 Telegraph Road 2. 1935-6 3. Architect: Walter Burley Griffin 4. Large house and garden. Alterations to garden terraces etc. 1969.

#### PYRMONT 2009

**Incinerator.** 1. Saunders Street 2. 1934-5 3. Walter Burley Griffin.

**Co-Operative Wool & Produce Stores [now Elder Smith & Co Ltd].** 1. Cnr. Wattle, Jones & Quarry Streets 2. 1905 3. Ross & Rowe 4. The world's largest wool stores.

#### ROCKDALE 2216

**House.** 1. 11 Heathcote Street 2. 1916 3. Peddle & Thorp [S.G. Thorp] 4. Clinker brick and stone Californian bungalow in large garden. Built for the architect's mother, Mrs. S.G. Thorp, snr.

#### ROOKWOOD

**Crematorium.** 1. Rookwood Cemetery 3. Harold Orr.

#### ROSE BAY 2029

**House.** 1. 26 Cranbrook Road 2. 1923 3. Architects: Hughes & Maloney 4. Sophisticated Georgian Revival detailing. Built for Mrs. Hughes.

#### STRATHFIELD 2135

**House "Darenth".** 1. 32 Albyn Road 2. 1908 3. G. Sydney Jones 4. Sophisticated simplified Queen Anne bungalow – the first split-level house in Sydney.

**House "Somerset".** 1. 119 The Boulevard 2. 1924 3. B.J. Waterhouse 4. Accomplished Georgian Colonial Revival house. Panelled hall with vaulted plaster ceiling. Courtyard. Billiard room by B.J. Waterhouse 1926. Lush garden by owner. Built for H. Larcombe.

**House "Brookby Lodge".** 1. 127 Homebush Road cnr. Victoria Street 2. 1923 3. A.L. Buchanan 4. Large, traditional house, English style, in garden. Specially engineered reinforced concrete footings.

#### ULTIMO 2007
